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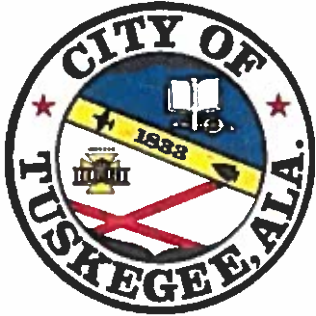

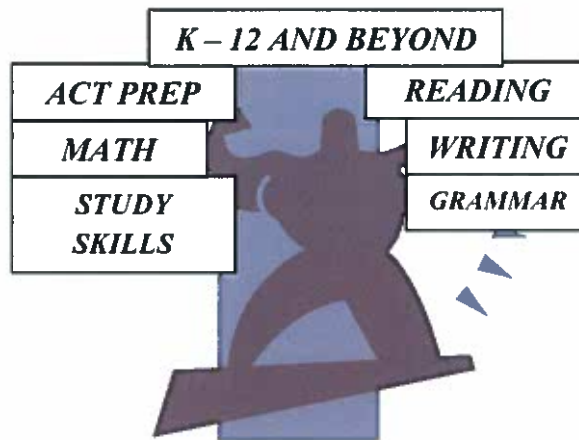

Policies:

Every center must abide by specific local and state regulations in order to protect the health and safety of all children, if they do not, the center will be closed immediately.

Late-Pickup Fee:

Exceptions will be made for emergency situations. Parents are required to contact the center if they are going to be late.

Arrival & Departure:

Each child must be signed in and out every day by an adult over the age of 18. The child will be released to only designated persons. It is the parents responsibility to keep a current list of persons who have permission to pick up the child(ren).

Food:

Each child will be served breakfast, lunch and a snack daily. However, when there is a scheduled field trip you must provide extra funds for the meals.
